

Onchette N

Wine grape variety.



Origin

This variety is native to the Isère region. Based on genetic analyses carried out in Montpellier, Onchette would result from the crossbreeding of Gouais blanc and Chatus.

Name of the variety in France

Synonymy

There is no officially recognized synonym in France nor in the other countries of the European Union, for this variety.

Regulatory data

In France, Onchette is officially listed in the "Catalogue of vine varieties" since 2016 on the A list and classified.

Description elements

The identification is based on:

- the white tip of the young shoot with a high density of prostrate hairs and a piping distribution of anthocyanin coloration,
- the yellowish young leaves with bronze spots,
- the shoots with red internodes,
- the circular, medium to large, bluish-green, matte adult leaves, entire or with three lobes, with shallow upper lateral sinuses, an open or slightly open V-shaped petiole sinus, short teeth compared to their width at the base with straight or convex sides, a weak anthocyanin coloration of veins, a revolute or slightly twisted leaf blade, undulate between the veins, and on the lower side of the leaves, a medium density of erect and prostrate hairs,
- the round-shaped or slightly ellipsoid berries.

Cultivation and agronomic skills

Onchette is moderately to highly vigorous and has an erect bearing. This variety shows good fertility when pruned short.

Susceptibility to Diseases and Pests

Onchette is very sensitive to grey rot.

Phenology

Bud burst: 3 days after Chasselas.
Grape maturity: mid-season, 2 weeks and a half to 3 weeks after Chasselas.

Technological potential

Onchette's bunches are small to medium, cylindrical and rather compact. The berries are medium, simple-flavored, with a thin skin and a juicy pulp. Onchette produces light, not very alcoholic, quite lively wines with fruity, spicy and peppery aromas.



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
